
Overcoming Comfort

By Darnell Duncan - Comfort can quickly change perspective. It blinds us to the realities beyond what our eyes can see. I often feel that comfort is a good place to be, but God often shows me that comfort can be the worse place to be.

When we are living within our daily routines, striving for peace and ease, we can very easily not live out the vision of God. Sometimes it's just that we aren't seeing the pain God sees and His purpose in it. Sometimes we aren't stepping out in faith to take an action God desires for us or cease an action God hates. Sometimes it is viewing others through human eyes and not God's eyes...each of us made in His image living in hurt, sin, and reality.

It's so crazy to me that in the months following our daughter's adoption, I was on fire to do it again. Love another child. Add to our family again. As time went on, my vision became tainted by comfort. I was no longer seeing her through the eyes of sympathy that come from envisioning her first 14 months in an orphanage. She became more comfortable in our family which was a good thing, yet it limited my view of adoption and what my purpose is as an adoptive parent. I lost motivation to step away from comfort and adopt again. It saddens me deeply that comfort can take away a longing, desire, and drive to do God's will.

God has revived my heart recently and I am so thankful. He has given me a renewed desire to live out His will...no matter what that is...despite a loss of comfort. Because ultimately comfort isn't what I'm living for!



I saw anew the lives of third world people. These people are a blessing from God. I saw children present everywhere we went. I read a statistic that 50% of the Ugandan population is under 18 years old. Our sponsorship of needy children allows for nutrition, shelter, physical care and love.

The Juna Amagara schools are doing a fine work with the students. We visited multiple schools and interacted with students and teachers. The students copy detailed drawings from a chalkboard into their notebooks. Creativity and lectures from highly knowledgeable teachers substitute for individual textbooks. I am very impressed with the dedication of the Juna Amagara staff and the atmosphere they have created.

My observation of the Juna Amagara facilities shows needs. I believe a combination of money and locally skilled artisans could go a long way towards infrastructure improvements. Employing those in the local economy to make bricks, etc., would feed people in need. Life and operations at Juna Amagara schools like Kishanje could be more effective with investments from our American resources.
