Day 1 TODAY'S THEME: EXPLORE IT Read Acts 21:15-26

#### Day 2 TODAY'S THEME: A GREAT REUNION Read Acts 21:15-17

Paul has been out and about on another missionary journey recently in the book of Acts where he has been revisiting churches that he had planted in the region of Asia Minor on some of his previous journeys. Now that he has returned to Jerusalem, he and his traveling companions are being reunited with some of his old buddies who had stayed with the church there.

There is something special about being reunited with friendly faces and long-time friends. I don't think this was a reunion like your annual family reunions where you sometimes dread some of the people you're going to see, but instead this was one of great joy and anticipation. This is the moment that Paul has been working so hard for - to make it back to Jerusalem. The greatest of reunions are those with whom we have deep bonds of inseparable unity - like that of faith in Christ. Think about it, one day we will all be reunited with believers who have gone before us in heaven and what a day that will be!

6. Who is someone you look forward to being reunited with in the future? What has caused your separation? What is it that has given you such a close bond with them? How do you envision your reunion to go?

7. Why is the bond of faith the deepest bond a human can have? Do you even think that's true? Why?

Now read Romans 8:35-39. How do these verses impact what you wrote down for your answer?

### Day 3 TODAY'S THEME: MINISTRY REPORT Read Acts 21:18-20a

Paul has brought back news from his missionary journey and the fruitfulness of his ministry to the Gentiles. Even just from the snippets that we have heard from his journeys throughout the book of Acts, we can only imagine how much he would have to share! I'm sure we would have loved to just sit and listen to all the work that God was doing as He was calling more and more people to saving faith in Jesus Christ!

As a result of Paul's report, James and the elders of the church worshipped and glorified God! As we serve in different ministries whether it be something here at home like the nursery or kid's ministry classes or maybe it's in far away lands on a missions trip, God gets all the glory for the work that takes place. God is doing great things all around the world and He should be glorified for it. We hear great testimonies from God's work here at home in our own church and in our own communities and every now and then we get to hear about what God is doing through our missionary partners all around the world. To God be the glory, great things He has done!

8. How can the ministry reports from church and missionary leaders encourage the church to worship God? How can they serve as a catalyst for ministry growth?

9. How do we balance the praise we receive when we are part of fruitful ministry work and God getting the glory for it all?

## Day 4 TODAY'S THEME: CAN OLD CUSTOMS WORK UNDER A NEW COVENANT?

#### Read Acts 21:10-14

These were Jewish Christians who remained devoted to the ceremonial aspects of the law. While not viewing it as a means of salvation, they still observed its required feasts, Sabbath regulations, ritual vows (v. 23), and dietary restrictions. Why were they still clinging to the customs and rituals of the Old Covenant? First, because those customs and rituals had been established by God. Coming to faith in Jesus Christ enhanced these Jewish believers' love for God and desire to obey Him and thus may have motivated a greater zeal for the old ceremonies. Second, the apostles and other leaders in the Jerusalem church did not oppose the continuation of these practices. Nowhere in the New Testament are Jewish believers condemned for observing them.

In fact, Paul commands tolerance for such "weaker brothers" (Rom. 14:1ff.; 1 Cor. 8–10) until they grow to understand their freedom and can use it with clear consciences. The Jerusalem Council (Acts 15), while forbidding the imposition of Old Covenant rituals on Gentiles, did not prohibit Jewish believers from continuing to observe them.<sup>1</sup>

## Day 5 TODAY'S THEME: THE NAZARITE VOW

Read Acts 21:23-24

James and the elders of the church have put together a plan for Paul to show all the Jewish believers who think he opposes them and the Old Testament teachings that Paul is not their enemy. The plan is that Paul will take part in a Nazarite vow with four other guys who were taking one. Being an Old Testament tradition (see Numbers 6:1-21 for explanation), Paul would demonstrate that he does not condemn Old Testament practices as long as they are not relied upon for salvation.

So what is the Nazarite vow? It was a vow where people would consecrate (or dedicate) themselves to God for a period of time. There were many rules they must follow and things they needed to stay away from during the time of their vow such as dead bodies, wine or anything grown on the vine, and they had to shave their heads. One of the most famous Nazarite vows we know of is Samson.

Now when we think of a vow, we think of it as something that was taken to get something from God. As if we were to say, I'll vow to do this if you'll do something for me. But in reality, these vows were more done in gratitude for something that God has already done for them!

- 13. What value do vows have in our spiritual walk with the Lord? Have you ever made a vow? What was your reason for making a vow to God? What was your vow?
- 14. Since vows were made out of gratitude, not requesting, what would be some things that you might be thankful for that God has been doing in your life lately that could spur you on to take a vow?

**PRAYER GUIDE**  $\succ$  Here is something you could pray for today:

- Praise and thank God for all the blessings He has given you.
- Consider making some kind of vow to the Lord out of gratitude for what He has already done for you.
